### Students with learning disorders in your classroom

Having a student with learning disorder in your classroom can be frequently overwhelming for teachers. They now face a challenge in order to address appropriately the needs of the Dys students. It is important for them to get support in order to use appropriate pedagogical methods to create an inclusive learning environment.

### What you can do to make a more inclusive environment for all your students:

Here is the list of ideas that you can apply in your classroom:

- Inform yourself on the DYS of your students and the skills it can affect as well as on the resources they have
- Develop an open and trustworthy parent – teacher relationship
- Talk to the student's parent to have more information about their specific situation
- Talk to other student teachers to set a common strategy to help the child. You can also talk to the school's technical experts (psychologist) who might be able to give you some additional information and advice
- Take your time to get to know your students better. It's important for the teacher not only to understand child's challenges but also their strengths and interests
- Identify how your student learns best and keep track of what has/hasn't worked
- Keep track of the student's progress
- Encourage Dys student to actively participate in the process
- Use Universal Design of Learning principles in your teaching
- Deny discrimination
